

HOST



Doug Leibinger is the director of jazz studies at Sonoma State University. His main instrument is trombone, but he also plays bass, guitar, piano, organ, and occasionally baritone saxophone and accordion. Originally from Chicago, Leibinger holds three degrees in jazz studies from the University of Miami, where he served as the conductor of their Studio Jazz Band for four years and studied composition and arranging with Ron Miller and Gary Lindsay. He was a trombone soloist on the University of Miami CJB's recording of Maria Schneider's *Three Romances*, which was nominated for a Grammy award in 2004. He also performed and recorded there with many jazz greats, including Vince Mendoza, Claire Fischer, Randy Brecker, John Faddis, Carl Allen and many more. Doug has performed and recorded professionally with a diverse array of pop, rock and Latin artists, including Chayanne, Peter Cetera, Sam Moore, Jerry Lewis, Jimmy Buffett, Maceo Parker etc., and has played music in over twenty different countries. Doug's compositions and arrangements have been performed around the world. His composition "Rasalgethi" was featured at the 2008 Great Lakes-Great Plains College Music Society conference, and his small group composition "Ring Shout" was performed by members of Chuck Owens's Jazz Surge at the 2nd Annual International Jazz Composers Symposium. More recently, his composition "Conflagración" was recorded by the California State Long Beach Jazz Orchestra, and programmed by Jeff Jarvis for the 2024 Kansas All-State High School Jazz Band. Leibinger also has written arrangements for Miguel de Armas, one of the founding members of the Cuban ensemble NG La Banda—Armas recently recorded them with his Ottawa Latin Jazz Orchestra. Doug lives in Santa Rosa, CA with his wife Cindy; their self-proclaimed "band kids" Zoe & Max; and dog Coconut.

ADJUDICATORS



Mary Fettig - Saxophonist/ woodwind doubler Mary Fettig has recorded and toured with such greats as Stan Kenton, Marian McPartland, Tito Puente, Flora Purim and Airto, playing jazz festivals including Concord, Monterey, Playboy, Chicago, Detroit, Buffalo, Montreaux, and North Sea. She regularly plays celebrity shows, having shared the stage with Seth Mac Farland, Aretha Franklin, Stevie Wonder, Natalie Cole, Tony Bennett, Robin Williams, Lady Gaga, Ray Charles, Johnny Mathis and many others.

She has extensive studio credits in film, television, video games and radio, including many Peanuts and Garfield cartoons and specials. In San Francisco she played 25 different Broadway shows in the pit orchestras as a woodwind doubler, with the record-breaking 5 year run of *Phantom of the Opera* as her longest run. She regularly performs with the San Francisco Symphony and various bay area orchestras.

Mary's own recordings include "In Good Company", "Relativity", and "Brazilian Footprints".


She is a former faculty member of San Francisco Conservatory of Music, Diablo Valley College, St. Mary's College and Los Medanos College. She stays busy as a free lance musician as well as adjudicating and performing with school groups.



Michael Galisatus is the director of the Stanford University Jazz Orchestra, the Stanford Jazz Workshop "Miles Ahead" Big Band, and professor emeritus at the College of San Mateo. Mr. Galisatus has produced award winning jazz and symphonic groups since 1980 and has been the recipient of various teaching honors including the California Music Educators Association (CMEA) Jazz Educator of the year, The CMEA Bay Section Outstanding Jazz Educator Award, The Peninsula Arts Council Arts Educator of the Year, the Otter Distributors 2004 Jazz Educator Award for the state of California, the California PTA Honorary Service Award, and the CMEA Bay Section Gil Freitas Memorial Award for music education. As conductor of the Stanford Live Orchestra, Michael has had the honor of conducting orchestral productions for Gregory Porter, Rufus Wainwright, and Ann Hampton Callaway.

Mr. Galisatus is in demand as a guest conductor and clinician throughout the western United States, including organizations such as the Monterey Jazz Festival, the Stanford Jazz Workshop, California Alliance for Jazz, and a host of others. In addition, Mr. Galisatus has presented workshops abroad, including Japan, China, Norway, Mexico, and Canada.

As a freelance trumpeter in the San Francisco Bay Area, has recorded with Pete Escovedo, and Queen Ida, and has performed with a variety of artists including Dianne Reeves, Tito Puente, Sheila E., Louis Bellson, Natalie Cole, Johnny Mathis, Kenny Washington, Paula West, Barry Manilow, Michael Feinstein, Mel Tormé, The Temptations, The Four Tops, The O'Jays, Malo, the Pacific Mambo Orchestra, and many others.



John F. Maltester has been a music educator for almost sixty years, with thirty-seven years as Professor of Music and Director of Bands at Los Medanos College and sixteen years as music professor at Saint Mary's College. He is also the Music Director Emeritus of the Contra Costa Chamber Orchestra, and the Artistic Director/Conductor Emeritus of the Diablo Wind Symphony. He is one of only two conductors to conduct both the California State Honor Band and Honor Jazz Band.

He has been a professional trombonist since age 16. His many recognitions include the CMEA Bay Section 'Lifetime Achievement in Music Education', and induction into the California Alliance of Jazz Hall of Fame and The Generations of Jazz Hall of Fame.

He is active as a clinician in rehearsal techniques and low brass performance, adjudicator, and guest conductor throughout Australia, the Western United States, Hawaii, and Alaska, and has recently released a new book *The Jazz Doctor – Solution-Based Approach to Jazz Ensemble Development*, focusing on jazz ensemble rehearsal techniques.



Jeff Jarvis is a multi-faceted music industry professional who maintains an ambitious international itinerary as an S.E. Shires trumpet artist and guest conductor. His solo recordings as a jazz trumpeter have received frequent airplay. Published by Belwin Jazz, UNC Jazz Press, iJazz and Kendor Music Publishing, Jarvis frequently composes for school, military, professional big bands and pops orchestras. Jeff serves as Director of Jazz Studies for the Bob Cole Conservatory at California State University Long Beach and has served as President of the California Alliance for Jazz, Vice-President of the International Association for Jazz Education, and was an owner of Kendor Music, Inc.

from 1985-2015. Jarvis is a member of the International Society of Jazz Arrangers and Composers and is a Gold Medal winner in the Global Music Awards, an international arts organization that recognized him in 2019 with a special award for "Lifetime Contributions to Jazz and Jazz Education".



Jeff Denson is an award-winning bassist, vocalist, and composer who has released 16 albums as a leader or co-leader and toured extensively throughout the US, Canada, and Europe with both his own groups and others at some of the world's most prestigious venues and festivals such as the Village Vanguard, Birdland, The Kennedy Center, JVC Jazz Festival Paris, Montreal Jazz Festival, Berlin Jazz Festival, and SFJazz, among many others. Jeff has worked with some of jazz's finest artists such as Brian Blade, Joe Lovano, Chris Potter, Mike Stern, Charles McPherson, Billy Childs, Jane Ira Bloom, Craig Handy, Ingird Jensen, Dave Douglas, Walter Smith III, Kendrick Scott, Rachel Z, Omar

Hakim, Gerald Cleaver, Anat Cohen, Warren Wolf, Leo Genovese, Etienne Charles, Edward Simon, Paul McCandless, Cuong Vu, Ralph Alessi, Dan Weiss, Lionel Loueke, Mark Turner, Paul Hanson, George Cables, Terri Lyne Carrington, Romain Pilon, Mimi Fox, and many others, and had an ongoing relationship with the legendary Lee Konitz for over a decade until his passing in 2020. Jeff's work has been reviewed in many of the world's leading periodicals including The New York Times, Washington Post, San Francisco Chronicle, along with many more international periodicals, and has been ranked in the DownBeat Rising Star Critic's Poll 16 times in the Bass, Electric Bass and Male Vocalist categories, and was the First Place Winner of the 69th Annual DownBeat Magazine Rising Star Critic's Poll for "Electric Bass" in 2021. Jeff is the Founder and President of Ridgeway Arts, Inc., a 501c3 arts nonprofit organization and the Dean of Instruction at the California Jazz Conservatory in Berkeley.



Issac Schwartz - Oakland native Isaac Schwartz has been teaching and performing for over twenty years. He leads his own groups and has been part of performances at The Soundroom, SF Jazz, Yoshi's, The Fox Theater, and much more. He frequently collaborates with incredible Bay Area artists and wonderful musicians from across the country. Isaac has found that community in music and mentorship are just as important as playing and he's proud to help facilitate the weekly jazz jams at Honor in Emeryville on Tuesdays, The Breakroom in Berkeley on Wednesdays, and the Muse Jam in Concord on Thursdays.



Erik Jekabson is a freelance composer, arranger, trumpet player and educator who lives in the San Francisco Bay Area. He is equally busy composing, arranging and playing for different bands, leading his own groups, teaching a wide variety of students and running the Young Musicians Program at the Jazzschool in Berkeley.

As an arranger and composer, he's arranged for symphony orchestras, (the San Francisco Symphony, the BBC Radio Orchestra, the Utah Symphony, the Coltrane: Legacy for Orchestra Project) vocalists, (Madeleine Peyroux, Ani DiFranco, Jane Krakowski, Jackie Ryan, Kenny Washington, Madeline Eastman) jazz ensembles, (The Daggerboard-

Erik Jekabson Orchestra, the Erik Jekabson String-tet, and his own Electric Squeezebox Orchestra, which holds a monthly residency at the Jazzschool in Berkeley) and co-composed the score for the documentary film "Exiled"

As a trumpet player, he's spent time on the road with John Mayer, Galactic and Illinois Jacquet, and has performed and recorded with other notable musicians such as Taj Mahal, Maceo Parker, Boz Skaggs and Kermit Ruffins. He has released eight albums under his own name (including four on his own record label, Jekab's Music), and produced three records with the Electric Squeezebox Orchestra.

FACULTY CLINICIANS



Kendrick Freeman Since moving to the Bay Area in 1974, my continuing study of the drums has resulted in a versatility that crosses borders. As a drumset player I met Bay Area greats George Marsh and Eddie Moore while working on a Bachelor of Arts degree at Lone Mountain College. The work ethic and example of these mentors has led me to a life of passionate exploration of music. I have been a National Endowment For The Arts grant recipient in Jazz studies. I received a grant from the Alliance for California Traditional Arts as part of my apprenticeship with Haitian master drummer Daniel Brevil.

I encountered African drumming in 1976, studying with Kwaku Dadey. In the 1980's I studied with Bay Area Congolese artists Malonga Casquelourd, Titos Sompa and Mbemba Pangou. In 1987 I began an association with Blanche Brown's Group Petit La Croix, the premier Bay Area Haitian dance company, eventually serving as musical director. This work lead to connections with the Haitian community in New York City that I maintain today. My Haitian teachers include John Scovel, Bonga Jean-Baptiste, Jean Raymond Giglio and Daniel Brevil.

I toured for five years with New Acoustic banjoist Alison Brown, and have recorded with Nashville dobro ace Rob Ickes. Since 1996 I have been a member of mandolin/fiddle/percussion player Joe Craven's trio with John R. Burr.

Current work includes a group with Cuban percussionist Carlos Medrano, a recording project with Pakistani singer Sukhwat Ali Khan, and Rara Tou Limen, the Oakland-based Haitian dance company.



Ian Carey is a San Francisco Bay Area-based jazz trumpeter, composer, arranger, and educator who “asks deep musical questions and comes up with compelling answers” (Bill Kirchner, composer/author). His musical projects include the Ian Carey Quintet+1 (“a highly skilled band of improvisers” –DownBeat), which has been performing his original compositions for over a decade and has been featured on five albums including the 2020 release *Fire in My Head* (commissioned by Chamber Music America’s New Jazz Works program); Wood/Metal/Plastic, a 7-piece group which “combines the delicately calibrated dynamics of a chamber ensemble with alternating sections of close voicings and free improvisation”—Andrew Gilbert, *Berkeleyside*); and Duocracy, a duo with pianist Ben Stolzow which explores rare American standards with intimacy and interplay.

Born in Binghamton, New York, and educated in Northern California and New York City (where he attended the New School and lived for seven years, studying with jazz legends including Reggie Workman, Billy Harper, and Andrew Cyrille), Ian has lived and worked in the Bay Area since 2001, performing with local bandleaders including Bryan Bowman, Nathan Clevenger, Lewis Jordan, Mark Levine, James Mahone, Anne Sajdera, Adam Shulman, and Suzanna Smith; and in ensembles including Anthony Brown’s Asian-American Orchestra, the Electric Squeezebox Orchestra, the Circus Bella All-Star Band, the Morchestra, the duo B. Experimental Band, and the North Berkeley Jazz Quintet, as well as appearing with visiting luminaries including John Daversa, Anton Schwartz, and Satoko Fujii. As a composer, Ian has received commissions from Chamber Music America and Intermusic SF, and was named as one of “12 Bay Area Composers You Should Know” by SFJAZZ in 2018.

Ian is an experienced music educator who has been a visiting instructor at Stanford University, California Jazz Conservatory, Santa Rosa Junior College, and the Stanford Jazz Workshop. He is also an avid writer and blogger; his writing has been featured in *DownBeat* and *McSweeney’s*

Internet Tendency, and his article “How Not to Become a Bitter White Jazz Musician” was mentioned by trumpeter Nicholas Payton as “the most brilliant piece that I have ever read about the dynamic of a White person in Black American Music.”
