#### Free but not Alone

Waking up a mountain, and my arms are wrapped around you. In the sky, it's in the stars yeah, it's up on Mars yeah.

Every time I look back to the Earth with all those setbacks. A volcano, left me waiting for nothing.

Up here I'm free, but I'm not alone. We're turning to the stars again.

# **NOTES**

"Where the Streets Have No Name" is the first track on U2's fifth studio album, *Joshua Tree*, released in March of 1987. The song was released as a single in August of the same year.

"Middle of the Road" appears on *Learning to Crawl*, third studio album by the Pretenders, released in January 1984. The song was released as a single earlier, in November 1983 in the U.S.

Released in mid-February 1988, "Under the Milky Way" is the second track on *Starfish*, the fifth album by Australian band The Church. The album was the band's most commercially successful release, and "Under the Milky Way" peaked at no. 24 on the *Billboard Hot 100*.

"No Reply at All" features a horn arrangement by Tom Tom 84 (Thomas Washington), who for years had been the horn arranger for Earth, Wind & Fire, and the "EWF Horns" play on the recording. The song is the second track on Genesis's 11th studio album, *Abacab*, which was released in August 1981. "No Reply at All" was released as a single (the second from the album) in September 1981. The song and the album marked a new direction for the group.

Drawing from an eclectic mix of influences including modern indie, 70s prog, post-punk, and chamber pop, From Flowers to Flies have crafted a darkly engaging sound that is wholly their own. The band formed in 2022 out of a desire to make cathartic music that was indicative of these uncertain times. Their songs hurtle through a landscape of anxiety and apocalyptic imagery, but never stray too far from a throughline of hope.

The eighth track on the Police's *Synchronicity*, "King of Pain" was one of four singles released from the album, which appeared in June 1983. The song peaked at No. 3 on the *Billboard Hot 100*.

Released in November 1983, Yes's eleventh studio album, 90125, marked a sea change for the band's sound, and it is not surprising that the group initially did not intend to call themselves "Yes," but "Cinema." The first single from the album, "Owner of a Lonely Heart," was released prior to the album release, and "Changes" was released as a single early the next year.

The Misfits released their fourth single, "Night of the Living Dead," on Halloween in 1979. The song was re-recorded for release on the album *Walk Among Us* in March 1982. The title and some of the lyrics are derived from the classic 1968 horror film.

Paul Simon's "God Bless the Absentee" appears on the soundtrack for the film, One Trick Pony and the album of the same name. Both were released in October 1980.
